There will be a guided tour at the cathedral for us at 3pm, we have been invited for coffee/tea afterwards and to stay for the Evening Prayer at 5.15-5.45pm. By train, the journey takes approximately 40 minutes from Ilford, via Shenfield, and the cathedral is a five-minute walk from Chelmsford train station. A Message from Bishop Guli: On Saturday, Bishop Guli issued the following statement as violent incidents continued in towns and cities across the country: "The outbreaks of violence we have seen across the country are deeply disturbing.
